### Lego Robotics Competition

First Lego League is a global science and technology challenge for teams of students, to encourage an interest in real world issues and develop key skills that are crucial for their future careers. The students work together to explore a given topic and to design, build and prpgramnme a LEGO robot to solve a series of missions. A group of KJS students recently took part; they had a great day and thoroughly enjoyed the experience.



### Paris trip

A group of 44 Year 9 GCSE and Year 13 students recently enjoyed a trip to the beautiful city of Paris. As well as improving their French language skills with a French language class and a fantastic evening at the theatre to see 'The Lion King' in French, they were able to see the many famous sites of Paris. Students visited the Eiffel Tower, the Louvre where they saw the Mona Lisa and they went on a

'Bateau Mouche' down the river Seine. They enjoyed visiting the Montmartre area and the Champs Élysées for a true French shopping experience. This was a culturally enriching trip, which really enabled students to develop their linguistic skills and was thoroughly enjoyed by both staff and students.





### Police Assemblies

On Tuesday, every year group in school had 10-minute assembly а by Nicholls, Neighbourhood delivered Holly Harrogate Outer Inspector. Inspector Nicholls gave students an understanding of her background and vision. She is a very experienced police officer who grew up in the Knaresborough area and is delighted to have returned to the town to take on this role, following a long period of time working in the Met. She lives locally and has children herself and is very committed to the town and to ensuring it remains a wonderful place to live and grow up. As a school, we work very closely with the police, the Town Council and other community organisations to have a joined-up approach to supporting this aim.



Inspector Nicholls explained that this brief assembly was following some incidents of anti-social behaviour in the town and that the aim was to explain how the police work with the whole community to keep everyone safe; what young people can do and what they can't; and what the police powers are if there is anti-social behaviour taking place.

It was made clear that we understand most of our students would not dream of behaving in a way that could be deemed to be anti-social and that they are always responsible and respectful. However, the messages are useful for all young people and that there may be times when they can support their peers by helping them make positive choices.

Inspector Nicholls stressed that if students are socialising without causing any anti-social right to do so. She suggested that they choose behaviour they have every an area away from housing such as Horeshoe Field and that periodic police will patrol to help check they are safe.

Further points she made clear are that;

- Legally, young people cannot drink alcohol until the age of 18 unless over 16 and with an adult in a hospitality venue, or at home with parental permission. They should expect alcohol to be confiscated from them and for them to be taken home to make sure they are safe, if they are found drinking alcohol or under the influence of alcohol in the town.
- Legally, if a PCSO or a Police Officer asks a young person to give their name and address they must do so. They may be detained until they do so, but this is not what the police want to do. On most occasions, if they give their name and address they will be able to go home and that will be the end of it.
- That if there is anti-social behaviour and young people are not responding, Inspector Nicholls has the power to put in place a dispersal order to prevent people from accessing an area for a period of time. This is not something she would want to do.

Inspector Nicholls stressed that if police are present and giving young people instructions, they need to listen and respond. The aim is always to de-escalate a situation and to keep everyone safe. We reinforced our school value of Respect – both within school and in the community and this is how we all want to work together.

Y11s completed a difficult Titration; Y10 completed a CSI style investigation testing different samples of urine to catch an attempted murder; Y9 had their practical skills tested with a Bake-Off Technical Challenge style activity with almost no instructions,

Y8 designed cars to survive crashes and be as aerodynamic as possible; and Y7 build bridges from spaghetti and scrap paper. The results are shown opposite.

The Science Department would like to thank all of the pupils for their excellent performances and behaviour during the events. And pass on a special thanks to the Science Technicians for all of the hard work that they put into preparing the experiments and to Mr McDonagh for organising the event. We hope that this can become a staple of the King James's House Competition!
