#### Thought for the Fortnight

Thought for the Fortnight for the week beginning 19th May is "Every journey you take on foot is a step towards a healthier you and a greener planet". It links to Walk to



School Week which is 19th – 23rd June.

Tutors will use the questions below to encourage discussion and debate.:

Key questions to discuss are:

- How does walking to school affect your mood or focus?
- What impact could it have on the environment if everyone walked to school one extra day a week?
- What barriers stop people from walking to school?
- What can we do to remove those barriers?

#### The key takeaways are:

- Walking boosts physical fitness and supports mental wellbeing
- Walking helps reduce traffic congestion and pollution in local communities.
- Walking to school encourages responsibility and a sense of routine.
- Even walking part of the journey makes a positive impact.

#### Ready for School

We welcome parental support in maintaining our high expectations during the final half term of this academic year.

Our school values of student being 'Ready' for school is vital in achieving this. Please can you remind your child and work with us on the following key areas

Uniform - Presentation both in school and in the community impacts on our reputation. Wearing uniform like business dress supports having the right mindset to learn. Shirts should be tucked in and skirts worn at least mid-thigh length. We do now allow plain black, flat, leather-looking leisure shoes, in addition to more formal footwear. However, trainers are <u>not</u> permitted. In addition, please ensure that students are wearing the correct PE uniform, i.e. KJS PEtops, shorts or skorts (plus leggings if required). Plain black cycling shorts are <u>not</u> permitted.

Mobile devices - in order to avoid unnecessary distractions, students are expected to switch mobile phones off and remove airpods, placing them in their bags before they enter the school gates, and they should remain out of sight until the end of the day at 3.15pm.

Water bottles - remaining hydrated helps students to focus.

Punctuality - at King James, we truly value both attendance and punctuality, as they play a key role in helping students get the most from their school experience.

Over the past few months, we've been looking more closely at punctuality across the school. We've introduced a punctuality contract for students who are regularly late to class, not to penalise them, but to support them in developing better habits that can make a real difference to their learning.

It might not seem like a big deal, but arriving late, especially first thing in the morning, can mean your child misses out on important moments that set the tone for the day. Our school day starts at 8.40am, with form time beginning at 8.45am. Those first 25 minutes are about much more than registration. They give students a chance to get organised, hear key messages, and check in with their form tutor, someone who is there to support their wellbeing as well as their learning.

When students miss even just a few minutes each morning, it can add up over time and begin to impact their progress. We know mornings can be challenging times, and occasional lateness is sometime unavoidable. That said, we really appreciate your help in encouraging your child to arrive on time whenever possible.

Our shared goal is to give every student the best chance to succeed, and with your continued support, we can make that happen, together.

#### Year 9 Book Club




