STEM Careers Talk

This Thursday, year 9 were treated to a special guest speaker. Mr Utkarsh Singh, 28, Director of Environment and Sustainability at Alstom (a railway company) gave a presentation about careers in Science and how the skills he uses on a day-to-day basis stem from those he learnt in school science lessons. From identifying and solving problems to looking at data, and communication research. useful skills to these have essential for him been



in all aspects of his job.

He then talked about how his career in science has opened many doors, including a personal invitation from the President of Senegal to a Formula-E race and an invitation to LA to accept an international Green Apple award for environmental work.

Measles

You may have heard in the news that cases of measles are rising across England, including among children. It's an infection that spreads very easily and for some people can cause serious problems. There's no specific medical treatment for measles, so

it's important to get vaccinated as it's the best protection against becoming seriously unwell.

The measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) vaccine is one of the routine childhood vaccinations, so most children are already vaccinated against measles. If your child

has received both doses of the vaccine, they are unlikely to have the virus. However, measles spreads very easily among those who are unvaccinated, especially in schools. The best protection against measles for children and adults is to get both doses of the MMR vaccine. It is never too late to have these vaccinations.

Uniform

Please support us with our uniform push after February half term by preparing your children now. We need to be united in our expectation of high standards – that students wear our KJS uniform as intended and with the pride it deserves and for a formal work environment. Key messages to reinforce please:

Formal black shoes are preferred, but students may wear plain black leather-looking, flat, smooth-soled trainers.

Kilts should not be modified and should be a reasonable length. When sold they are either 18" or 20" long and so they should be at least mid-thigh. Students will be asked to unroll kilts. We will contact parents if kilts are unreasonable in length and ask that it is corrected or that they wear trousers.

For health and safety reasons, students may not wear acrylic nails or hooped earrings.

Students should attend school wearing the full uniform each day which includes the bottle green blazer or jumper with the school crest.

The aim of us giving parents and students half a term's notice is to avoid the need to speak to students about their uniform, so we can all focus on learning. However, having made our expectations clear, after half term we will follow behaviour processes for students who do not comply.

German Exchange 2024

2024 marks a true milestone as this year, King James's School is proudly celebrating 50 years of the annual school exchange with its partner school, Brüder Grimm Gesamtschule in Knaresborough's twin town of Bebra. In the summer of 1974, the first party of German pupils came to visit, but as former languages teacher and UK founder of our school links, Alan Hemsworth remembers, the exchange was very nearly still-born. "We had serious difficulties infinding accommodation for all the pupils and only a last-minute appeal in the local paper saved the day." In the end two pupils stayed with the local milkman, two with the proprietor of a local coach company and two in a caravan at the bottom of a garden.



A large majority of host families, both in Knaresborough and Bebra are past participants themselves and feel that reciprocating host duties is important for the longevity of our

partnership. The Bürgermeister in Bebra who was the driving force of town twinning, supported the school exchange visit, played his host family role as indeed his son and later his grandson took part in the exchange. Every year, I come across students participating in the exchange whose parents have fond memories themselves of spending time with their German friends. The school's original aims in promoting the exchange were simple but important, and still hold good today: to promote tolerance, understanding and friendship, and a desire for pupils of all ages to learn a foreign language. In an era when taking a foreign language to GCSE level is no longer compulsory, the exchange is still seen by KJS as a key opportunity for students to widen their experience, and the Bebra programme is believed to be one of the longest running in English schools.

There have been some adventures down the years and some lifelong friendships have been forged, between both pupils and staff. Much has changed in 50 years! Where exchange students used to rely on pen and paper to stay in touch they



now keep up friendships via What's App, Snapchat and email. Indeed, our exchange students often 'meet' their new friends virtually before they meet face to face.

This year, we are looking forward to our special visit to Bebra in March. Twenty students between the ages of 13 and 16 are leaving KJS by coach and ferry, along with three staff, to embark upon a visit of a lifetime, donning our commemorative hoodies with funding received from Knaresborough Town Council. Our visit coincides with an '50th anniversary event' to be held in the Lokschuppen, an event centre in Bebra. I even have had a celebratory logo designed by our very own web designer, Miss Sandground. Mrs

Martin, as well as various town dignitaries will also be in attendance at this momentous occasion on 21st March. There will be opportunity to catch up with old friends, to look back over 50 years of exchange, celebrate this significant school and community event and to look forward to many more years of friendship with our German friends. Here's to the next 50 years!
