It's important to always think about if your choices at 16 will help you achieve your future goals when you are 18 and older. Top tip! Your Choices

During your education you may have choices about what subjects you want to study.

You will be able to speak to your teachers about what subjects are on offer. You also need to start to think about what job you may want to do in the future and choose subjects that will help you to succeed in that job. Talk to your teachers, professionals, parents and carers to help you decide.

> There will be some subjects that you need to study - your school will let you know what these are. You'll also be given support to decide what level is best for you to study these at.

> > After this, it will be time to think about your next steps after school and consider what you would like to do when you are 16 and 18.

There are a number of options open to you at 16:

- Full time education (school sixth form, sixth form or further education (FE) or specialist college, training provider or home education).
- Combine work and study (Traineeships, Apprenticeships, and Supported Internships).
- Volunteer or work part-time and study.

Whatever choices you make, remember:

- Consider more than one option.
- Check application closing dates.
- Visit the places you would like to apply for and meet the staff.
- Speak to your teacher, parent/ carer or professional for advice.

Qualifications & Pathways

It is important that you continue to receive training and education and there are many different qualifications and 'pathways' you can take as you progress.

We've listed some of the qualifications and their levels here, remember not all qualifications are offered everywhere. You may need to speak to someone to help you to understand the levels and what qualifications would be right for you.

Pre-Entry

Basic knowledge and skills, not aimed towards specific jobs.

You will gain appropriate qualifications in: Reading, writing and spelling, communicating, basic mathematics, IT and general study skills.

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Small Business & Self Employment

Trying self-employment

If you're considering selfemployment, there's a lot of support and advice available to get you started.

Self-employment can be working from home for a few hours a week or it can be full-time in an office.

Skills you need to be self-employed

These can be things you do yourself or may need help with:

- Maths and literacy
- Record keeping
- Using social media to promote your service or product
- Building a website

Working at your own pace

You do not need to work every day if you're self-employed. You can choose your own hours, depending on the time or energy you have. Working for just a few hours is still working. For example you could:

- Work when you can, which could vary from week to week
- Increase your hours slowly because you want to work full-time

- Type letters, reports and other business documents
- Update computer records
- Print and photocopy items
- Order office supplies
 - Set up meetings and take notes during them

Bricklayer

- Measure work areas and set out the first rows of bricks or blocks
- Mix mortar by hand or with a mechanical mixer
- Use a trowel to lay bricks and mortar
- Shape and trim bricks using hammers, chisels and power tools
- Check that rows are straight using a spirit level, laser level or plumb line

Roles in the creative and digital sector use the latest technologies and include work in film and TV, social media, advertising, fashion, computer games and animation.

- Monitor the progress of the copying run and quality check samples

The Energy Sector relates to the making and supply of energy. Renewable energy comes from natural resources such as sunlight, wind, rain, tides, and waves. Waste recovery is important, converting animal, plant or crops into energy

Large goods vehicle driver

- Provide excellent customer service to promote your company
- Make sure companies and individuals get the goods they need
- Plan delivery schedules and routes with transport managers
- Make sure loads are safely secured
- Check your vehicle to identify and report any issues
- Drive safely within the law and keep your vehicle tidy and roadworthy

CVs and Interviews

If you are in an education and training setting you should get a chance to visit employers and other education and training providers. In addition, representatives will visit your setting and talk about their jobs and industries. Experiences of work are important to help you decide what type of job you would like in the future.

CV stands for 'Curriculum Vitae' which means 'story of my life'.

It is usually a maximum of two pages A4.

If you need some help, speak to a teacher, professional or family/carer about CV writing support.

An interview is a chance for an employer to see if you're the right person for the job. It's your chance to make a good impression and show what you have to offer. Many employers will ask you if you need support for an interview process. Speak to the employer to find out the process for getting a job with them.

People will often ask for examples so it's wise to think these things through in advance.



Supported Internships are now available

What is a Supported Internship?

A Supported Internship is one type of study programme specifically aimed at young people aged 16 to 24 who have an Education, Health and Care (EHC) plan, who want to move into employment and need extra support to do so.



Where will it take place?

A Supported Internship will usually be based at an employer.

How long will it last?

A Supported Internship normally lasts for a year, including unpaid work placements of at least 6 months.

What will I do?

You will complete a personalised study programme which includes the chance to study for relevant qualifications, if suitable, and English and maths.

What happens after?

Wherever possible, you will be supported to move into paid employment at the end of the Supported Internship.

Benefits of a Supported Internship

- Develop skills valued by employers
- Have chance to show your value in the workplace
- Build confidence in your own abilities
- Gain experience to put on your CV
- Improve your skills in English & Maths
- Become an independent traveller
- Show everybody you can do it!

How is a Supported Internship different from an Apprenticeship or Traineeship?

They are similar, but they have a few differences.

You will receive a higher level of support on a Supported Internship. This will probably include a job coach and further help with your learning that you do away from the workplace.

Supported Internships are also usually longer than a Traineeship, giving you longer to get ready to progress into an Apprenticeship if this is what you would like to do.


