





Dear Parents and Carers,

It has been an extraordinarily busy autumn term and, as we think about finishing for Christmas, there are a few key messages to share, as well as some news to report about events in school.

Mock exams Year 11 and Year 13:

The year 11 pupils conducted themselves very well in the mock exams. It was a hard couple of weeks for them, but absolutely necessary that we got back to real exam practice after so much Covid disruption. They will be getting the results from those mocks shortly, and will have time to act on the feedback before the real thing. Just a reminder that in my last newsletter (available on the website) I did set out the exam board adjustments for the pupils sitting public exams next summer. Year 13 have their mocks in the new year. The revision support is available on the website.

Post 16 options:

Following a highly successful careers fair in November we will have a Sixth Form open evening on 12th January. This will be an opportunity for our current Y11 pupils to learn more about King James's Sixth Form and the courses on offer. This will be followed by a taster day on 9th February where Y11 can sample A level lessons.

Headteacher recruitment:

The chair of governors wrote to all parents in July 2022 to explain that I am retiring from my post as Headteacher after 15 years at King James's School. My leaving date is confirmed as 31st March 2023. They are currently recruiting for a new Headteacher and interviews will take place on 9th and 10th January.

Values and Expectations

We are delighted that in the main our students transitioned smoothly back into the KJS community in September by being 'ready, respectful and engaged'. Certainly a large majority of our students have sustained really high standards over the past term regarding the meeting of our expectations around these values and we thank you for your support and cooperation with this. At the start of the new term in the New Year we will be resetting and refocusing on the importance of being 'ready' both physically (by wearing the correct KJS uniform with pride) and practically (with regard to having the correct equipment and by being on time to learn by being punctual). For some students it may be necessary to use the Christmas break as an opportunity to 'reset' and to consider ways in which they can ensure that they have a positive and consistent approach to our values and expectations from the offset in January. We ask that any uniform issues (including incorrect footwear) are addressed over the holidays so that on our return students can start afresh in a positive way.

Student Illness

A reminder that when pupils are ill during the school day they should not be calling home directly to ask parents to come and pick them up. We are aware that illness is more prevalent at the moment but any parental contact to come to collect a pupil should come through the school nurse. We would be grateful for your support in reiterating this to your child/ ren to ensure that the correct procedure is followed.

This campaign was inspired by the tragic story of Kerry's daughter Leah who died aftertaking drugs in 2019. Leah was 15 when she lost her life in a car park in Northallerton after taking two MDMA bombs whilst with a group of friends. Kerry wanted to help other parents to have proactive and positive conversations with their children about drugs and alcohol, and also teamed up with Commissioner Zoe to create the "NotMyChild" campaign. Careers Week - Learning Cycle 1

During every Learning Cycle there will be one week devoted to Careers during tutor time and assemblies for every year group. In October we had our first week which concentrated on helping students identify their skills and personal qualities and what this means for making key choices. We had a range of visiting speakers in to talk to students about the importance of self-awareness in career choice and to talk about their journey. Speakers included the RAF, York College and Ask Apprenticeships.

Careers Week - Learning Cycle 2

During the next Learning Cycle, we will be looking at progression opportunities for all year groups and at the choices students make at the different key stages. For instance Year 9 will focus on option choices - and where they might lead. Years 11 and 12 will be reviewing their choices and ensuring they know how to apply for the next stage of their career journey. This will also include ensuring they all have a back up safety plan.

German Exchange 2023

We are looking forward to welcoming 20 German students from our partner school in Bebra, Germany in March 2023 to stay with 20 KJS students and their families. A programme of activities, both in and out of school, awaits our German friends. This academic year marks the 49th year of exchange between the two schools, a partnership which is one of the longest running exchanges between a British and German secondary school. Our students will have the opportunity to return to Germany in 2024.

Macmillan Coffee Morning

In October, Sixth Form students held a cake sale in aid of MacMillian. They did a tremendous job of baking, donating cakes and running the sale, and raised a total of £394.58. Well done to everyone involved.





Wellbeing Ambassadors

Our brilliant team of Sixth Form Wellbeing Ambassadors have been busy this term. Four students have been meeting weekly with a small group of Year 7 boys to help them feel more settled. Another has been helping Ms Tarren with the Year 8 Flourish project after school. Last Friday, three Ambassadors braved the cold weather and planted over 100 spring bulbs at the front of sixth form. The team has lots more plans in progress to support others in school and we are proud of the contribution they are making to KJS.





Mental Health Support Team

The Wellbeing in Mind Team (WiMT) is a Mental Health Support Team (MHST) which is an NHS service that has been introduced as part of the national plans to expand mental health services for children, young people, and their families within the education setting.

The Wellbeing in Mind Team aims to positively impact the mental health and wellbeing of young people by:

- Using low-intensity evidence-based CBT interventions for low mood and anxiety.
- Working closely with each school's identified Mental Health Lead (a senior member of the school staff who has received specific training to support this role) to support individual referrals through consultations.
- Supporting each school in developing and maintain a 'whole school approach' (WSA) which includes delivering assemblies, classroom-based sessions, staff training and workshops covering a range of topics.
