You will be sitting a full paper but all the topics we have or will cover by the time the exam takes place.

The activities and questions relate to what is on the paper. You will notice that each unit has four topics these correlate to the a, b, c, and d questions. For example; unit on Christian Beliefs – The Problem of evil and suffering will be an a mark question whereas Creation will be a d mark question. This allows you know how to manage the time you spend on revising for each topic.

The paper will take two lessons to complete.

It will be done under timed conditions.

You will also receive a hard copy of the revision materials to help you.
