Year 7 Self Exploration: Personal Skills and Qualities for your future.	 Students will develop an understanding of what personal skills and qualities are. Students will be introduced to key employability terminology focusing on the skills and qualities needed for employment. Students will be able to link the extra-curricular and enrichment opportunities in school with the development of their individual skills and qualities. Year 9 Exploring your Personalised Progression Pathway.	 Students will have access to relevant, up to date labour market information from quality assured sources (eCLIPS). Students will develop an understanding of what local, national and international employment opportunities are for them now and in the future. Students will know and understand what options are available to them at the end of Year 9 and will have a good understanding of what subjects are required for certain careers. Students will review progression opportunities open to them – including academic and vocational choices and gaining an understanding of Post 16 and Higher Education options. Students will understand the concept of lifelong learning and the importance of gaining transferable skills.

Year 10	 Students will have an introduction to careers guidance and planning and what to expect from a careers guidance appointment. Students will do a self-evaluation on their employability skills and identify areas of strength and areas of improvement.

Students will be encouraged to engage with experiences of the workplace through volunteering, part time work and virtual work experience.
